"I am willing," he said. "Be clean!" Immediately he was cleansed of his leprosy. ⁴ Then Jesus said to him, "See that you don't tell anyone. I say to you that many will come from the east and the west, and will take their places at the feast with Abraham, Isaac and Jacob in the kingdom of heaven. But the subjects of the kingdom will be thrown outside, into the darkness, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth." Then Jesus said to the centurion, "Go! Let it be done just as you believed it would." And his servant was healed at that moment."

Sermon – Willing and Able (Stephen T)

It can be a terrible thing to get sick or injured or traumatised. For it means we can't do the things that we want to do. We can't live the life that we want to live. But here in Australia in 2025 we have to admit that we live in extremely fortunate times. Not only do we have access to prayer and the God who can heal but the Lord has also given us doctors and surgeons and psychologists and physios who can heal our illnesses, help us right many of our wrongs with surgery and gives us techniques that can help with our mental illnesses.

So, in the last few years, I have had my ACL repaired giving me the chance to run and play sport again. My brother-in-law Barry has had surgery replacing a bladder filled with cancer with a new one made out of his intestines and I have heard two examples of people in our Church having Chronic Fatigue whose lives have been turned around by the skill of those who specialise in dealing with that disease.

But it is not full healing only substantial healing. For last year while rolling over in bed in the wee hours of the morning my repaired ACL snapped again. My brother-in-law Barry has had plenty of complications to his operation and those people cured from Chronic Fatigue still find themselves really tired on occasions. Full healing rarely happens today. But it did happen all the time when Jesus healed. And in our passage today from Matthew 7 we find three examples of how Jesus heals amazingly, fully, completely. Starting when Jesus

1. Cleanses the physically unclean (Verses 1-4)

"When Jesus came down from the mountainside, large crowds followed him." Jesus has just been with his disciples preaching the sermon on the mount and now he comes down from the mountaintop and into the valley where there are loads of hurting people. And on this occasion, he doesn't give them more preaching but a demonstration of his power. He is going to show one & all he won't just make great claims but can deliver on those claims. For this man teaches with all authority, yes, but he also has authority over sins and diseases.

² "A man with leprosy came and knelt before him and said, "Lord, if you are willing, you can make me clean." ³ Jesus reached out his hand and touched the man. "I am willing," he said. "Be clean!" Immediately he was cleansed of his leprosy."

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Now leprosy was, and in some parts of the world today still is, a terrible disease to have. For if you have leprosy, you lose all sense of feeling in your hands and legs. Which means they can be easily burnt, maimed, disfigured because if something bad happens to them and you don't realise it is happening, you don't feel the pain! Dr Brand, a Christian missionary even tells the story that lepers in his village were having their toes and fingers eaten off by rats while asleep and it happened, because they couldn't feel anything happening.

It also was a contagious skin disease so the leper was shunned and had to live on the edge of the town so that they wouldn't infect anyone else. And all of us having gone through COVID know that being isolated from others just adds to your pain and suffering. But when this leper hears that Jesus is in town, he heads straight toward him and I can imagine the crowd parting like the Red Sea. And giving him a very, very wide birth.

Now this leper knows that Jesus has the power to heal, what he is unsure about is if Jesus would want to heal him. He's a leper. He's unclean. A social and physical and spiritual and ceremonial outcast. Does Jesus care about him? Is he willing to do something to help him?

And Jesus doesn't say, "Wait a second I am a preacher not a healer." Instead, he says, "I am willing." And he shows his willingness by touching him. Now, how long was it since that man had last been touched by anyone? A year? 2 years perhaps, maybe 10 years? We are not told. But the touch of Jesus hand shows not just his love but his power, for immediately there is full healing. Without the help of pills or surgery or a physio, not only does the disease go but the effects of the leper's disease goes, as well.

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A number of years ago Princess Di touched an AIDS patient and it caused a storm. For it showed her love for the unlovable but unfortunately, she could only show her compassion for them. Jesus shows his power and his compassion. His love and his ability to heal.

For the Kingdom of God has now come. Yes, it had been announced in Jesus preaching but in the healing ministry of Jesus it is now well and truly breaking in. In the words of Emil Brunner "Jesus will not storm Israel with his messianic claim", instead he will "Knock quietly at its door, leper by leper, little by little."

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⁴ "Then Jesus said to him, "See that you don't tell anyone. But go, show yourself to the priest and offer the gift Moses commanded, as a testimony to them." Your testimony shouldn't be your words, because people will not believe them. Instead, you should do what the law requires and go to the priests. The priests won't be able to heal you but they can declare that you are now healed. And will give you permission to go back to your old way of life and that will be a testimony to them and to others. That Jesus has both the power and the passion. He is able to heal and, in this case, he is willing to heal.

But Jesus doesn't just heal sickness, but sin. J.C. Ryle, the then Bishop of Liverpool, was not the first to see the similarities. He said, "But is there nothing like leprosy among ourselves? Yes, indeed there is. There is a foul soul-disease which is engrained into our very nature & cleaves to our bones & marrow with deadly force. That disease is the plague of sin.

Like leprosy, it is a deep-seated disease infecting every part of our nature – heart, will, conscience, understanding, memory, and affections. Like leprosy, it makes us loathsome & abominable, unfit for the company of God and unmeant for the glory of heaven. Like leprosy, it is incurable by any earthly physician and is slowly but surely dragging us down to the second death. And worst of all, far worse than leprosy, it is a disease from which no mortal man is exempt. We are all in God's sight as an unclean thing – Isaiah 65:4."

Which means if today you have a disease like leprosy, or if something has removed you from society and the result is that you are all alone. Then Jesus has the power to heal. He also has a willingness to heal. Now there is no guarantee that in your circumstances his will for your life is to heal you now. The apostle Paul struggled with a thorn in his flesh, 3 times pleading with God to take it away and was told instead that "My grace is sufficient for you." In that circumstances and in some of our situations we need to place our need in his hands & trust that the one who is able to heal also knows when best to heal, in this life or the life to come.

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James Montgomery Boice in the year 2000 was diagnosed with cancer and then shared with his congregation how they should pray for him. "Should you pray for a miracle? Well, you're free to do that, of course. My general impression is that the God who is able to do miracles — & he certainly can — is also able to keep you from getting the problem in the first place. So, although miracles do happen, they're rare by definition. A miracle has to be an unusual thing

Above all, I would say pray for the glory of God. If you think of God glorifying himself in history and you say, where in all of history has God most glorified himself? He did it at the cross of Jesus Christ and it wasn't by delivering Jesus from the cross, though he could have.

When things like this come into our lives, they are not accidental. Its not as if God somehow forgot what was going on and something bad slipped by. God is not only the one who is in charge; God is also good. Everything he does is good." Boice died 8 weeks later but his last words and actions brought great glory to God. In Matt 8 we see Jesus cleanses the unclean

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2. And he heals the ethnically outcast (Verses 5-13)

You see if the leper was a crowd splitter, the Centurion who comes to Jesus next is a crowd stopper. ⁵ "When Jesus had entered Capernaum, a centurion came to him, asking for help."

Now the next person who meets Jesus is a real outsider and some one despised by the Jewish people. For this centurion was not just a Gentile, ethnically unclean but a member of an invading force that was brutally ruling over them. But this Centurion was not throwing his weight around, he was humbling himself. He wasn't giving orders to others, instead he was appealing to Jesus. He was asking Jesus for help.

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His servant was paralysed. This slave at the bottom of societies pecking order is suffering terribly. And this centurion couldn't do anything about it. But somehow, he knew that Jesus could. "Jesus says, Shall I come and heal him?" The centurion replied, "Lord, I do not deserve to have you come under my roof. But just say the word, and my servant will be healed. For I myself am a man under authority, with soldiers under me. I tell this one, 'Go,' and he goes; and that one, 'Come,' and he comes. I say to my servant, 'Do this,' and he does it."

Amazingly Jesus is willing to come into a Gentiles house, which was a real no-no in those days. That would make him unclean & unable to worship God at the temple. But the Gentile knows he is not worthy of that sort of an honour. You see this Centurion realises that Jesus doesn't have to physically touch his servant in the same way he touched the leper. There is no magic formula going on here. All he has to do is say the word and his servant would be healed. For the key issue is not how God heals but who is the one doing the healing.

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"When Jesus heard this, he was amazed and said to those following him, "Truly I tell you, I have not found anyone in Israel with such great faith." The people of God, the ones who should be a light to the Gentiles are not showing anywhere near the faith that this outsider, this Gentile is showing. He believes that Jesus can heal. He has humbled himself before Jesus. He is admitting that he is unworthy. He is expressing his complete confidence in the fact that Jesus has authority over the sickness that is causing distress in his own slave.

As Hebrews 11:6 says, "Without faith it is impossible to please God, because anyone who comes to him must believe that he exists and that he rewards those who earnestly seek him." Now there is no evidence that Jesus had healed by long distance before this time but the Centurion has the faith that anyone who comes from God should be able to be healed.

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Jesus continues, ¹¹ "I say to you that many will come from the east and the west, and will take their places at the feast with Abraham, Isaac and Jacob in the kingdom of heaven. ¹² But the subjects of the kingdom will be thrown outside, into the darkness, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth."

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God's kingdom is an upside down one. Those subjects of the kingdom, the Jews who don't have faith will be thrown outside and miss out on all of its blessings. But those outsiders, the Gentiles who do have faith will take their places when the Kingdom comes in all its glory. This is staggering. For the Jews by their law keeping thought they were the insiders and the Gentiles who didn't follow the law were the outsiders. But that is not what will happen. Those who have faith in Jesus, both Jews and Gentiles will be the ones who will enjoy the spoils of the coming Kingdom of God & those who don't have faith will miss our completely.

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13 "Then Jesus said to the centurion, "Go! Let it be done just as you believed it would." And his servant was healed at that moment." Notice that when the centurion goes. When he steps out in faith, the healing of his servant occurs. Of course, the centurion doesn't know that until he gets back home. And that is often the nature of faith, we believe that Jesus is willing and able but we don't see the effects of the power of Jesus until much later. We walk by faith not sight. Because according Hebrews 11:1, "Faith is being sure of what we hope for and certain of the things we do not see."

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3. Jesus cleanses the unclean, heals the outcast & **restores the culturally marginalised**14 "When Jesus came into Peter's house, he saw Peter's mother-in-law lying in bed with a fever. 15 He touched her hand & the fever left her, and she got up and began to wait on him."

This is the only healing in the gospels where there is no request for healing but instead Jesus takes the initiative to heal. Peter's mother-in-law. I wonder if Peter ever forgave him for that? But this was no joking matter, it was a serious problem. Fever was the biggest killer in the ancient world. But look at this wonderful picture of compassion. Jesus touches her hand. The fever leaves her. And she gets up. Just like that. Full healing. For a woman. For someone who was culturally marginalised.

Just looked at who has been healed in these verses from Matthew 8 – a leper, a Gentile and a woman. In those days all were outcasts, all second-class citizens. But with the coming of Jesus, they are not on the outer any more, they can be on the inside.

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Just think of the temple for a moment it had various courts and various walls between each court. The outer wall stopped all unclean people coming, no lepers were allowed in the temple complex at all. When you got through the outer wall there was the court of the Gentiles but there was a wall stopping them going any further. Women could go into the next court but there was another wall stopping them from where the real action was.

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But with the coming of Jesus, access to the Lord is not just for Jewish men but women and Gentiles and even the unclean. Not just for the select few but for all who have faith in Him and we see that in verse 16 "When evening came, many who were demon-possessed were brought to him, and he drove out the spirits with a word and healed all the sick."

The doors of healing are flung wide open. Notice there's no case too big or too small. Leprosy, that's not too big for Jesus. Fever, that's not too small. Demon possession, paralysis, illnesses Jesus can drive them out with a word. For the word of God is powerful. Satan, sickness and sin doesn't stand a chance. And why is that? Because the Messiah is here. And according to Isaiah 53, this Messiah, this Jesus

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4. He carries our diseases (Verse 17)

You see all these healing miracles begs the question. Why? Why would God send his son Jesus into the world to deal with sickness for such a short period of time? Why haven't people before & after had access to this sort of power? Why not eradicate sickness & death completely? Why send Jesus now to preach the kingdom & to display its upcoming power?

Well, the obvious answer is that it shows us that Jesus cares. God's son isn't aloof to the pain and suffering in this world and so when he comes physically into the world it shows us that Jesus is not just concerned about people's eternal salvation but also about their ongoing health and welfare. But if you go a little deeper you will see that when Jesus heals, he is fulfilling Old Testament prophecies about the coming Messiah.

Isaiah 35:4-6 says "Your God will come... he will come to save you. Then will the eye of the blind be opened and the ears of the deaf unstopped. Then the lame will leap like a deer and the mute tongue will shout for joy." So, when the leper is healed and blind see, when demons are cast out and fevers go, it is to point people to the coming of the Lord. And his chosen one the messiah. God is here, right now. So, listen to what he says.

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But our passage points us to one more reason why there is now a flood gate of healing taking place. ^{17"} This was to fulfill what was spoken through the prophet Isaiah: "He took up our infirmities" and bore our diseases." Jesus wasn't just the Messiah he was also the promised suffering servant spoken about in Isaiah 53. "A man of sorrows and familiar with our suffering." The one "was pierced for our transgression and crushed for our iniquities."

You see this Messiah humbles himself & becomes our suffering servant. He is willing to be unclean, he is willing to be an outcast, he is willing to be marginalised and even to die on the cross in our order to cleanse us of our sins, heal us of our illnesses, and to break down the walls separating all people from God so that they can now live for eternity in His presence.

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You see this is also a picture of what he will do for us on the cross. The apostle Paul puts it this way in 2 Corinthians 5:21 "God made him who had no sin to be sin for us, so that we might become the righteousness of Christ." You get it? Jesus takes our sin and pays its penalty on our behalf on the cross. Jesus takes our separation from God onto himself so that we can be brought near by the cross. Jesus brings in God's kingdom and makes it available to you and I but to do that he must take our infirmities and our illnesses and our sins upon himself, in order to destroy them all. And in the place of our sin, sickness & suffering, God's kingdom promises we will receive Christ's right standing before God. How amazing is that?

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And note this. God can not only do that for you. But he is willing to do that for you. And the response he requires of us is faith. To be like that centurion and walk the path that we are called to walk, not seeing all these things have now happened, not experiencing the full wonders of the Kingdom but knowing when we get home, when we get to our eternal home, we will see that they have all come true. No sin. No sickness. No alienation. Because we now know Christ and his righteousness.

So where does that leave us now? If the kingdom has started, can you and I who have faith always receive full healing? No, I don't believe that the Bible promises this in this world, only in the world to come. But we do have access to the power of Jesus and so we know that he is able to heal and in some circumstances God's will can and will bring about healing for us in today's world. So, before I end, I want to give you three pieces of practical application

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A. When you are sick turn to Jesus first. When you are lonely, when you are marginalised, when your body is falling apart turn to him and pray. Pray for help. Pray for strength. Pray for healing. Pray that God will get the glory no matter what happens. You see often the first thing we do is reach for some medication. Or we ring up the doctor. Or we complain to our family. But that is not the first thing the man or woman of faith should do.

We should turn to our heavenly father in prayer. Praise Him for his power. Thank him for his love. Worship him in his sovereignty. Confess to him that you are unworthy of His gracious care. And then tell him what is going on. Tell him how you feel. Tell him your sorrows and your frustrations and ask that his will be done in these circumstances.

B. Secondly, then look to the medical profession. James 5:13-14 says, "Is any one of you in trouble? You should pray. Is anyone happy? Sing songs of praise. Is any of you sick? He should call the elders

of the Church to pray over him and anoint him with oil in the name of the Lord." Oil was something that consecrated people to the Lord but it was also a common medicine. So, one interpretation of this passage is to call the elders and take your medicine.

For God has gifted many people in our nation with great skills. And one way he heals today is through the ordinary means of medicine, so make good use of it.

C. And finally ring the elders. Ask the Church to pray. Let the people of God stand with you in this matter. Today we are too private about these things. We don't want people to know or to worry, we can deal with this on our own. No that's not what the man or woman of faith does. They follow God's word. They commit themselves to God and opens up the doors of the church.

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Will that give you full healing? Maybe. God is capable of that. Will it give you substantial healing? Yes! As Jeames goes on to say "And the prayer offered in faith will make the sick person well. The Lord will raise him up. If he has sinned, he will be forgiven." God will answer that prayer. He may not save you from your disease like he didn't save James Montgomery Boice. But he will save you from your sins. He will ultimately heal you. He will forgive you.

Because friends, the Kingdom has come. Not fully yet but it is still breaking in. And the men and women of faith will enjoy the spoils of that kingdom both now and forever more when they put their faith in Jesus.
